## CTE Spring Data Collection BEGINS March 1

The Career and Technical Education (CTE) Spring Data Collection begins March 1, 2019 and ends April 30, 2019. This AIM collection asks schools to identify all 12th grade high school students who were enrolled at any point during the current 2018-2019 school year who meet the definition of a CTE Concentrator. CTE Concentrators are 12th graders who have earned three (3) or more credits in any CTE program in any combination during their years of high school. Currently enrolled CTE courses count toward credits earned. CTE Concentrators must have the 'CTE Concentrator' box checked and an 'Area of Concentration' entered into the AIM/Infinite Campus data system. If the student has a child or shares the parenting of a child, the 'Single Parent' box should also be marked. High schools who receive funding from the Carl D. Perkins federal grant program must complete this CTE Spring Data Collection.

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## Montana FFA News

Congratulations to the FFA Chapter from Missoula for being the first chapter to qualify a team for participation at the 2019 National FFA Convention in Indianapolis. The



Missoula chapter earned first place honors at the MAGIE/KMON state meats competition held January 19th in Great Falls. The chapters from Kalispell and Grass Range placed 2nd and 3rd respectively. In addition to the meats competition, sales and service, agronomy and livestock contests also took place during this event. While not recognized as national qualifying events, Kalispell earned first place honors in sales, Choteau placed first in agronomy and Grass Range took home top honors in livestock.

About fifty-five teachers from across Montana attended the winter MAAE (Montana Association of Agriculture Educators) meeting which was held January 26th in Lewistown. Discussion topics included legislative work, Region I conference in Alaska, CDE days schedule in Great Falls and the upcoming State FFA Convention which will be held in Bozeman, April 3-6. In conjunction with the winter meeting, the Lewistown FFA Alumni hosted their annual mechanics competition. There were about 150 students competing for awards with the students from Missoula besting the rest of the field and earned first place team honors. The next competitions will be the Conrad Alumni Seminars on March 1st, CDE Days in Great Falls on March 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup>, and a host of district competitions taking place throughout the next month.

The state officers are beginning work on state convention planning. We are excited to have A'ric Jackson serve as our keynote speaker and Luke O'Leary – the National FFA President participate at our convention. Approximately thirteen hundred students and three hundred parents will attend the annual convention.

Montana Business Educators Attend & Lasso their Legacy at 2019 WBEA Conference Business educators from Montana traveled to Tucson, Arizona, over the President's Day weekend to attend the Western Business Education Association's 2019 Conference. Hosted by the Arizona Business Education Association, the WBEA 2019 Conference—Lasso Your Legacy—was held in Tucson's Oro Valley February 14-17.

Over 100 business educators from across the western United States traveled to Tucson to participate in leadership training, hands-on technology workshops, instructional sessions, certification testing, exploration of curriculum resources and tools from national vendors, and professional networking.

Health Science Update:

"Define Your Purpose" is the theme of our 15th Annual State Leadership Conference in Bozeman, March 12-13. In addition to the competitive aspect of the conference, there will be a vendor fair with 12 exhibitors, and over 20 educational symposia and workshops featuring everything from the Medevac Black Hawk helicopter to pig heart dissections led by Bozeman WWAMI students. Our Opening Ceremony speaker is Billings Senior High Chemistry and Earth Science teacher, Chris Beal, 2015 Montana teacher of the year recipient. National HOSA Executive Council President-elect, Vivian Do, UCLA microbiology, immunology, and molecular genetics major, will be in attendance and will host workshops. 2019-'20 Montana HOSA State Officers will be announced.

This year we are offering 32 competitive events in Leadership, Teamwork, Health Professions, Emergency Preparedness, and 11 knowledge tests during our two-day conference. New competitive events this year are Pharmacy Science and Surgical Technician, and an on-site Medical Spelling Bee.

Many CTE teachers attended the CTE Manager training held the week of Feb. 4-8. Next steps will be to determine program needs, work with the designer to implement changes, and begin training teachers throughout the summer and fall. This is a tool for schools to use to collect data on work-based learning hours for Perkins V and State CTE funding.

The office of the Commissioner of Higher Education and Office of Public Instruction are holding a series of meetings with Advisory members, stakeholders and the public regarding what goes into the Perkins V State Plan. CNC Institutes: Bozeman High School, July 22–26, 2019, Bozeman, Montana

These week-long professional development events are funded by the National Science Foundation and designed to train teachers who are interested in establishing a guitar building course at their own schools. Faculty participants will receive a \$300 stipend, and will finish the week-long institute with their own custom-built guitar. In addition to building their very own instrument over the course of the week, participants will depart with instructional materials for educating students about the math and science behind the instrument as well as the engineering and technology involved in the building process.

This program, now in its eleventh year, has been tremendously successful in training new teachers and supporting existing programs in 48 states from coast to coast!


