

# CAREER and TECHNICAL EDUCATION UPDATE December 1, 2018

## **Fall 2018 CTE Data Collection CONTINUES**

The Fall 2018 CTE Data Collection begins on October 1 and ends December 31, 2018. The Fall CTE Data Collection is a follow up to last year's Spring CTE Data Collection. Students identified as CTE Concentrators last year (2017-2018) and graduated in the spring of 2018 should be contacted between October 1 and December 31 and asked their current post-graduation status. After contact, the appropriate post-graduation status code must be entered into the AIM/Infinite Campus data system for each CTE Concentrator. All high schools that received funding from the Carl D. Perkins federal grant program in 2017-2018 are required to complete this fall follow up collection to maintain their eligibility to receive Perkins funding.

Instructions for completing the Fall CTE Data Collection--called the 'Quick Reference Guide' for the Fall CTE Data Collection--are located in two places on the OPI website: on the AIM web page under the AIM User Guides button and also on the CTE web page under the 'Data Collections' button.

<u>PLEASE NOTE:</u> Be sure to verify the list of CTE Concentrators from what your district submitted last spring. Any additions, corrections, or changes to the list of CTE Concentrators must be made no later than **November 15, 2018**, to be accurately reflected in federal reporting and used to compute Perkins Performance Indicators for your school.

The John Deere Ag Expo (JDAE) was recently held at Montana State University in Bozeman and was hosted by the Montana FFA Foundation. Over 1,300 students from across the state participated in this three-day activity. Competitions were held in



21 different areas. In addition to contests, students were involved in two different leadership development opportunities. One of these activities was designed for the younger members and was titled "Montana Leadership Conference" and the other activity was developed for older students and was referred to as the "Premier Leadership Conference". Close to four-hundred volunteers helped make the 2018 JDAE a true success.

The Montana FFA State Officers just completed their final officer development program. This program occurs over a four-month period and is referred to as the state officer continuum. The continuum is offered through the National FFA Organization and is staffed by national trainers. This final part included training in the areas of team dynamics, speech delivery and group presentations.

The state officers will begin their chapter visitations during the two-week time period before Christmas. The goal is to visit each of the 97 Ag programs across the state and offer students a workshop of their choice. Visits will take place in programs from Bainville to Lima and from Ekalaka to Kalispell. The officers will travel in pairs to conduct this annual activity. Upcoming activities include the Gold Conference in Bozeman which is held to develop potential state officer candidates, KMON competitions in Great Falls which includes the state meats competition, and the Fergus mechanics competition where the winter Ag teacher's meeting will take place during this event.

Many attended the Farm to School Summit in Missoula in September, and many participated in Crunch Time in October to celebrate Farm to School month. Family & Consumer Sciences educators have continued to attend professional development during the school year including the National JumpStart Conference in Washington, DC and ACTE CareerTech Vision in San Antonio, TX.

In October and November, hundreds of Montana FCCLA members attended one of ten district meetings throughout Montana. District meetings are coordinated by district officers; led by the state officer. Meetings are focus on leadership development of members. Attendees conduct service projects to benefit their local communities, attend workshops about leadership, meet new friends, and learn about ways to build their career-ready skills through participation in Montana FCCLA Competitive Events. In addition, each district conducts a business meeting, which includes the election of the 2018-19 officers. Results of the elections will be available in December.



Chapters throughout Montana are currently working on local level projects to support our State Outreach Project, Vision Zero. These projects are in coordination with the Montana Department of Transportation, Ford Driving Skills for Life, and the National Road Safety Foundation. Grants were offered by our partnering organizations this fall. Sixteen chapters received a total of \$23,733 in grant money to implement to educate students and their community about the importance of making informed, responsible decisions regarding traffic safety.

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## Industrial, Trades and Technology Education

The Specialty Equipment Market Association (SEMA) is now accepting applications for the 2019 SEMA Memorial Scholarship Fund for students preparing for careers in the auto or autoparts industries at www.sema.org/scholarships.

New this year, high-school and part-time students can apply for a scholarship. The change is part of an effort by SEMA's Scholarship Committee to start students down the automotive path and support their efforts at an earlier stage.

"SEMA is dedicated to activating the next-generation automotive workforce by providing financial support and career resources to students enrolled in various high schools, universities, colleges and/or vocational schools in the United States," said SEMA Chairman-Elect Tim Martin.

The SEMA Memorial Scholarship program offers financial assistance of up to \$5,000 to help foster the next generation of automotive aftermarket industry leaders and innovators. Students can apply for the scholarship at www.sema.org/scholarships. The program opened November 1, 2018 and the application deadline is March 1, 2019.

Scholarships are available in a variety of categories, such as accounting, sales and marketing, and engineering. Dozens of awards ranging from \$2,000 to \$3,000 will be given out, with a \$5,000 award going to the top student.

The program also includes a loan-forgiveness aspect that offers financial awards to employees of SEMA-member companies who are paying off a loan for a completed program of study at an accredited university, college or vocational/technical program within the United States.

This year, \$297,000 was awarded to 102 individuals, including scholarships for current students and loan forgiveness awards to employees of SEMA member companies. More than \$2.5 Million has been awarded to 1,400 students since 1984.

Students who were awarded scholarships in 2018 represented a variety of declared areas of study such as:

Automotive Technology, Automotive Aftermarket, Auto Body and Collision, Automotive Machining, Automotive Restoration, Business Administration, Business Management, Chemical Engineering, Computer & Information Sciences, Diesel Technology, Education, Electrical Engineering, Graphic Design, Industrial Engineering and Design, Journalism, and Welding.

#### SEMA GRANT FOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

SEMA has launched the Automotive Aftermarket Grant Program, in which the association will engage elementary school teachers and students across the nation in the automotive hobby, career pathing and lifestyle.

SEMA is offering grants of up to \$1,000 to at least 50 elementary school teachers to support the incorporation of a hands-on, interactive automotive lesson plan or activity into their classrooms. Ideas for the automotive-driven projects are solely up to the creativity of the teachers applying for the grants and must be incorporated into their curriculum before the end of the 2018–2019 school year. This program directly supports SEMA's youth-engagement initiatives to inspire and ignite the next generation of automotive enthusiasts.

If you work with elementary schools or know an educator who may be interested in this program, please spread the word. Educators may apply for up to \$1,000 in grants to fund their automotive inspired projects. The application period will end Monday, December 10, 2018.
