

# Statewide Summary of Montana's 2019-20 Traffic Education Programs\*

(From the period of July 1, 2019 - June 30, 2020)

#### PROGRAM ENROLLMENT

- 182 public high school districts were **eligible** to offer a traffic education program.
- 125 high school districts **offered** a state-approved traffic education program.
- 12,338 public and private high school students were eligible to enroll in traffic education.
- 7,382 students completed traffic education (includes 104 students enrolled in private schools).

#### WHEN OFFERED

- 32 districts offered the program before school hours.
- 31 districts offered the program during regular school hours.
- 54 districts offered the program after school hours.
- 89 districts offered the program in the summer.

#### **PROGRAM FEES**

119 high school districts charged a fee. The mode fee was \$200.00.

The minimum fee was \$50.00. The maximum fee was \$600.00.

10 districts plan to increase the fee charged students for the upcoming school year and summer.

#### PROGRAM CHARACTERISTICS

- 125 Districts screened students' vision with an eye exam before behind-the-wheel instruction.
- 125 Districts emphasized and required the use of seat belts.
- 125 Districts required a Parent Meeting to review schedule, requirements and parent role in Graduated Driver Licensing.
- 125 Districts offered traffic education for students with disabilities.
- 55 Districts granted credit for successful completion of traffic education.
- 63 Districts offered **pedestrian** safety instruction in the elementary and middle schools.
- 74 Districts offered school bus rider safety instruction in the elementary and middle schools.
- 60 Districts offered bicycle safety instruction in the elementary and middle schools.
- 116 Districts taught an instructional unit on sharing the road with **motorcycles**.
- 125 Districts taught an instructional unit on the effects of alcohol/drug and encouraged students not to drive impaired.
- 124 Districts used the Office of Public Instruction (OPI) Web site to obtain traffic education information.
- 123 Districts used Montana's current Traffic Education Curriculum Guide for its high school program.
- 76 Districts employed a traffic and safety education coordinator and/or supervisor.
- 33 Districts offered traffic education for adult beginners.
- 124 Districts participated in the Cooperative Driver Testing Program (CDTP).

# NUMBER OF TEACHERS AND RATES OF PAY

- 58 full-time traffic education teachers were employed.
- 208 part-time traffic education teachers were employed.
- \$20.00 per hour is the **minimum** rate paid.
- \$47.52 per hour is the maximum rate paid.
- \$25.00 per hour is the mode minimum rate paid.
- \$25.00 per hour is the **mode** maximum rate paid.

# **VEHICLES**

- 233 vehicles were used in the program.
  - 9 districts obtained their vehicles on a free loan basis.
  - 2 districts obtained their vehicles on a daily fee basis.
- 17 districts obtained their vehicles on a lease or rent basis.
- 106 districts **owned** their vehicles.
  - 0 districts used **other** means to obtain vehicles.

# **CRASHES**

- 5 traffic **crashes** occurred involving a student driver while in the traffic education vehicle.
- 0 persons were killed.
- 0 persons were **injured**.
- \$32,735.85 property damage costs incurred.

# **COST PER PUPIL**

\$464.64 is the average per pupil cost. (District costs were partially offset by state reimbursement amounting to \$113.36 per pupil).
