The mission of the Montana Teacher of the Year program is to elevate student success by empowering classroom innovation and enhancing pathways to teacher leadership.



- The TOY program elevates student success by celebrating teachers who honor individual student strengths and each child's unique abilities.
- The TOY program empowers classroom innovation by recognizing teachers who are responsive to the complex realities that define Montana's diverse and unique classrooms across the state.
- The TOY program enhances pathways to teacher leadership by creating teacher ambassadors at the local, state, and national level to connect classrooms to the community.

Selection Process

The MT TOY Program is part of the National Teacher of the Year Program conducted by the Council of Chief State School Officers (CCSSO), of which Montana's Superintendent of Public Instruction is a member.

Diverse statewide selection committees review and interview applicants to determine the finalists and ultimately the Montana TOY who then competes at the national level to become CCSSO's National TOY. All active Montana K-12 teachers who are making a positive difference for students in their community are encouraged to apply.

Teachers can self-nominate by filling out an application or any member of the public can fill out an online <u>nomination form</u> for a Montana teacher they feel is qualified. The OPI will then reach out to the nominated teacher and ask that they complete an application.

Please indicate evidence of student impact. Please do not include external links. Maximum word counts are indicated in parenthesis.

- 1. Describe a content lesson or unit that defines you as a teacher. How did you engage students of all backgrounds and abilities in the learning? How did that learning influence your students? How are your beliefs about teaching demonstrated in this lesson or unit? (maximum 750 words)
- 2. Describe a project or initiative you have been involved in which contributed to the improvement of overall school culture. What was your role, how did you collaborate with others, and what is the status of this project today? Please include evidence of student impact. (maximum 500 words)
- 3. How do you ensure that education transcends the classroom? Describe specific ways in which you deliberately connect your students with the community. Please include evidence of student impact. (maximum 500 words)
- 4. What do you consider to be a major public education issue today? Describe how you demonstrate being a lifelong learner, leader, and innovator about this issue, both in and outside of the classroom walls. (maximum 500 words)
- 5. As the 2021 Montana Teacher of the Year, you serve as a spokesperson and representative for Montana teachers and students. What is your message? What will you communicate to your profession and to the public? (maximum 750 words)
