


# Teacher Externships



### Montana Teachers Experience Industry First-Hand

### Teacher externships offer hands-on knowledge outside of the classroom.

High school students from across the state will learn from their teachers' experiences about the work that takes place in Montana's businesses.

#### Teachers will:

- Participate in three day externships.
- Share lessons learned with fellow educators.
- Present what they have learned at various education conferences
- Earn continuing education credits and a \$600 stipends upon completion.

Applications open in early January and close on March 1 to allow for matching.



### **Work That Matters**

Work-based learning (WBL) opportunities span a continuum from workplace tours to apprenticeship (and many models in between).

In addition to building employability skills, WBL experiences help students develop meaning from their classroom learning and explore purposeful career opportunities. Employers who intentionally cultivate belonging in the workplace for young workers can gain access to future workforce talent. The Montana Work-Based Learning Collaborative works to promote belonging, meaning, well-being, and purpose for all young Montanans by building capacity for high-quality WBL experiences.

There are components of work-based learning in the K-12 education system, the postsecondary education system, and the public workforce system – but no single entry point for students or employers to access them. Our work to improve coordination among agencies and WBL partners benefits Montana's emerging workforce and Montana's businesses.





### Who We Are

A cross-section of public and private sector organizations with a stake in work-based learning, working together to ensure Montana students, educators, and businesses are supported by high-quality, accessible, relevant, and measurable work-based learning opportunities.

Reach Higher Montana (RHM), a statewide nonprofit organization working at the intersection of education and careers, is the intermediary for this work. RHM provides coordination, bridges connections, and focuses on long-term and system-wide outcomes.
