# Chippewa Cree Language Preservation Pilot Project Survey Results





#### Overview

- A 21-item paper survey was designed and revised in January 2014
- The survey was administered to adult tribal members and descendants from February to June 2014
- An electronic version of the same survey was created on SurveyMonkey in February 2014
  - Available on Facebook, SCC Website, and emailed directly to tribal members and/or descendants

#### Overview, continued


- The goal was to have 600 surveys completed to provide key information for other aspects of the project including:
  - The status of the Cree and Chippewa Languages at Rocky Boy
  - Data to inform curriculum development and lesson plans for participants in the pilot component of the project
  - Topics to be addressed at the Summer Language
     Camp

### Survey Findings

- There were 540 surveys completed—representing 90% of our goal of 600.
- Data categorized in four categories:
  - Demographic information (gender, age, home community, level of education)
  - Usage of and connection to Cree Language
  - Usage of and connection to Chippewa Language
  - Interest in project and comments about survey

### Demographic: Gender


• 63.89% (345) female and 36.11% (195) male

### Demographic: Age Groups




### Demographic: Home Community


### Demographic: Levels of Education




### Education Levels, continued

### Importance of Having Knowledge of the Cree Language as part of Tribal Identity






### Family Members Who Spoke Cree as a Child




#### Other than Family, Who Spoke Cree?

- 52.59% (284) indicated Teacher


### If you do not speak Cree, would you like to learn?




# Have you ever taken a Cree Language Class?




# Have you ever studied Cree on your own?



### Do you currently speak Cree?




# Ranking of Abilities in Cree, where 1 = fluent and 7 = no ability

- To help keep Cree culture and tradition alive






