# **2024 GIFTED AND TALENTED STATE GRANT REPORT**

**Biennial Report, September 2024** 

# **OVERVIEW**

The current biennial grant period for the Gifted and Talented State Grant runs from July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2025. The Montana State Legislature provided \$700,000 total in grant funds for the two-year grant cycle. The amendment to 20-7-904, MCA added new district reporting requirements set out in section (4), effective October 1, 2019. The Office of Public Instruction (OPI) data shown below includes data from the 2022-23 and 2023-24 school years.

#### **GIFTED AND TALENTED STATE GRANT**

Fifty-one school systems submitted the <u>Intent to Apply</u> for the Gifted and Talented State Grant funds in this grant cycle. The <u>Intent to Apply</u> also documents the school system's intended local match. Gifted and Talented Funds are not awarded above the districts stated local match. All school systems selected one of their Legal Entities (Elem, HS or K-12) to act as the fiscal agent for the two-year Gifted and Talented State Grant.

The table below summarizes the number of schools receiving funds from the Office of Public Instruction for Gifted and Talented programs (pursuant to 20-7-903, MCA) by student enrollment/school system size. A detailed list of all FY 2023-25 Gifted and Talented Allocations is available in **Appendix A**.

# PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT IN THE EVALUATION PROCESS

Districts receiving grant funds were required to submit their Gifted and Talented Program Plan to the Office of Public Instruction prior to grant approval. The OPI Gifted and Talented Program Plan template includes a section to provide for parental involvement in the evaluation process.

On the FY 2023-25 grant application, twenty eight of fifty-one school systems (55%) noted parental involvement in the evaluation process through the use of a Parental Observation Checklist.

#### **GRANT FUNDED TRAINING ACTIVITIES**

The FY 2023-25 school systems receiving grant funds are currently utilizing the funds in a variety of ways for professional learning and development. Thirty-five of the fifty-one grant school systems (69%) are using grant funds for staff professional development. Some examples include attending the Montana Association for Gifted and Talented Education (AGATE) Conference and the National Association for Gifted Children (NAGC) Conference.

#### **DESCRIPTION OF GIFTED AND TALENTED SERVICES**

The school systems receiving grant funds identified unique uses for the funds to meet their local needs for providing Gifted and Talented Services. Of note:

- Forty-five of the districts are using grant funds for curriculum differentiation
- Sixteen of the districts are using grant funds for acceleration programs
- Nineteen of the districts are using grant funds for individual long-range learning plans
- Seventeen of the districts are using grant funds for secondary level programming

### **EVALUATION OF PROGRAM EFFECTIVENESS**

At the end of the 2021-23 grant cycle, districts completed a program report to detail the effectiveness of Gifted and Talented programs. Interim reports on the FY 2023-25 grant were not required. This Program Report included the outcome of their locally identified student growth objectives. The data included Page | 2

measures such as student achievement or growth, indicators of student and parent satisfaction with the program; and other gauges of program quality as determined by the OPI. The objectives and measurements are provided by each district in the "Objectives" portion of the grant application. Individual G/T Grant Program Reports are viewable through the <u>E-grants System Public Access</u>. Select E-grants Access Select, search for a District, select "2023" Fiscal Year, and scroll down to find "Gifted and Talented Program Report" and click "Open".

#### **GIFTED AND TALENTED STATEWIDE DATA**

Statewide Gifted and Talented data from the 2022/23 and 2023/24 school year was collected through OPI's TEAMS and AIM data management systems and is aggregated below.

#### 2022/23 School Year Data:

- 6076 students were evaluated for Gifted and Talented programs
- 6058 students were identified as Gifted and Talented
- 325 of 409 districts report providing services for Gifted and Talented students
- 193 of 409 districts identified a gifted coordinator
- 285 of 409 districts offer training to their staff regarding Gifted and Talented education

## 2023/24 School Year Data:

- 5996 students were evaluated for Gifted and Talented programs (1.1% decline)
- 5986 students were identified as Gifted and Talented (1.3% decline)

#### Data collection:

- a. SY 2022-23 TEAMS (School Data Collection System) TEAMS previously used a checkbox to indicate if a district provided Gifted and Talented services. If the district did not provide Gifted and Talented services, the box would be left unchecked. For SY 2022-23, TEAMS asks for further information in order to collect more specific data. Specific additional questions are (1) What services for Gifted and Talented students do the districts implement and (2) What professional learning and development opportunities do the districts offer?
- b. AIM (Student Data Collection System)- AIM has been changed to include indicators of "students evaluated" and "students identified". Starting in SY 2024-25, OPI will be collecting the dates evaluated and identified that will carry with the student and will no longer need to be marked in AIM annually.
