Revitalizing Native American Languages

Fast Facts

Curriculum Area: Social Studies Grade Level: High School

Suggested Duration: Two – three 50-minute class periods

Stage 1 Desired Results

Established Goals

- (1) The civics and government content standards for ninth through twelfth grade are that each student will:
- (e) evaluate how citizens and institutions address social and political problems at the local, state, tribal, national, and/or international levels.
- (4) The history content standards for ninth through twelfth grade are that each student will:
- (c) identify ways in which people and groups exercise agency in difficult historical, contemporary, and tribal contexts;
- (e) explain events in relation to both their intended and unintended consequences, including governmental policies impacting American Indians;
- (j) analyze perspectives of American Indians in US history.

Understandings

- The ideologies of Native traditional beliefs and spirituality persist into modern day life as tribal cultures, traditions, and languages are still practiced by many American Indian people and are incorporated into how tribes govern and manage their affairs. (EU 3)
- Develop an understanding of the historical and contemporary context regarding Native American language issues.
- The consequences of assimilation practices have significantly impacted the lives of Native peoples.
- Develop an awareness of Native American language revitalization efforts in Montana.

Essential Questions

- Why is it important for American Indians to maintain/revitalize their languages?
- How does the loss of Native language impact Native peoples in America?
- What historical events and policies contributed to the endangerment of Native Languages?

Students will be able to...

• Analyze and evaluate various types of primary and secondary resources, including oral accounts, regarding the loss and revitalization of Native languages.



Students will know...

• American Indian tribes shared a similar history with regard to loss of languages and many tribes are taking deliberate actions to reverse this trend and produce more fluent speakers.

Stage 2 Assessment Evidence

Performance Tasks

- 1. Students will research and analyze issues regarding Native languages. Students will write up a brief essay and actively participate in class discussion.
- 2. Students will examine Native American language apps and report out their findings.

Stage 3 Learning Plan

Learning Activities:

Hook Strategy

Ask students who has seen the film "Finding Nemo." Then show this clip from the <u>Navajo version</u> of the film and facilitate a class discussion about what they saw.

Introduce students to the topic of Native American languages by posing the following questions:

- 1. In just North America, how many Native American languages do you think were spoken prior to 1491?
- 2. How many Native American languages do you think will be spoken in 2091?
- 3. Do you think it is important for American Indians to continue speaking their languages?

Share the background information below. Ask students to think about what this means to contemporary American Indians.

- Prior to European contact Native Americans in North America (excluding Mexico) spoke over 300 distinct languages.
- In Central and South America, there were over 500 distinct languages.
- European conquest, colonization, and deliberate cultural genocide led to the disappearance of hundreds of Indigenous languages, and Native communities are still dealing with the impacts of culture and language loss.
- Linguists estimate that over 50% of the remaining Native American languages have fewer than 1,000 speakers.
- If language patterns do not change in many Native American communities, only a dozen or so will still be spoken by the year 2050.
- Many tribal nations are working hard to revitalize their cultures and languages.
- Montana tribal nations and the state of Montana have been working to maintain tribal languages via legislation and through private and public education systems.

Facilitate a class discussion regarding these key concepts and check for student understanding.

Show students the film <u>Full Circle</u>, which is about Blackfeet language revitalization. The film was a Blackfeet Community College student production in collaboration with Montana State University produced in 2015. Facilitate a class discussion regarding key ideas and themes from the film.

Next, assign students two readings for homework. They will be required to complete the readings before the next class and write a brief reaction paper (1-2 pages) summarizing what they learned. The readings are about Crow language revitalization efforts and language revitalization on the Fort Peck Reservation.

Have students turn in their reaction papers at the beginning of the next class period. Conduct a follow-up discussion over the major points/issues put forth in each article. Ask all students to orally summarize their reaction papers so the rest of the class can hear about their perspectives.

Pose the following question from the previous day.

- ♦ How many Native American languages do you think will be spoken in 2091?
- ♦ Ask students if they have changed their opinions as a result of the readings and discussion.

Assignment: Utilizing On-line language resources – Native American Language App/On-line Language Resource Activity, students will research a Native American app or a Native American language website and share their reactions with fellow students through a brief in-class presentations or some other type of demonstrative project. Suggested time for presentations is five-ten minutes depending on class size. Links to Montana tribal specific resources are included in this lesson.
